b	Observance of Trial in two cases, one Civil and one Criminal Students may be required to attend two trials in the course of the last two or three years of LL.B studies. They will maintain a record and enter the various steps observed during their attendance on different days in the court assignment. This scheme will carry <b>30 marks</b> .	
c	Interviewing techniques and Pre-trial preparations and Internship diary. Each student will observe two interviewing sessions of clients at the Lawyer's Office/Legal Aid Office and record the proceedings in a diary.
